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2022 Bath Cup Champions!

It's been worth waiting for — we're Bath Cup Champions! The centenary edition of the Bath Cup, the world's longest-running Club Squash competition, has been won by Roehampton Club, and about time too!

Ten years of domination by the Lansdowne Club has been ended in emphatic style as Roehampton Club are poised to go through the season undefeated (two matches left to play). 3/0 and 2/1 victories against Lansdowne were core to the successful season enjoyed by the team, alongside two 2/1 victories against third-place finishers Queens. Cumberland posed some serious questions to the top teams during the season, but we have been lucky enough to catch them at inopportune times.

Team stalwarts of Steve Richardson and Ben Coates have been consistent throughout the season, both undefeated, so far. Providing that core stability each week to enable first season rookie Lewis Walters to claim the glory playing at number one. Lewis has only lost two very tough encounters, one against Lansdowne's number one, Ben Garner, for which he gained revenge in the vital match in the second half and a misfiring performance against Queens, when the season was already done and dusted. He has been a great addition to the Club going out of his way to make himself available for matches.

Ben Coates has played the season at number three, though is more than capable of stepping up into the higher positions. He has been the rock of the team, only dropping two individual games during the season. He has shown great maturity and

Club commitment to be there every week when there were times his opponent was not able to compete with the standard he is playing.

Steve Richardson, Club Captain, has played in the middle order throughout the season. His highlights have come about with double victories over his aging nemesis. Lansdowne's Tim Garner, and the pride he takes in the other members of the team consistently performing to such high standard. It is also an accolade to the other team members that they have politely listened to him reminisce during after match dinners. As they can all attest, the older Stevie gets the better he was!

Much needs to be said for the members of the Squad. Without a rotating squad it would be impossible to win such a competitive league. Dropping even a couple of points can tip the apple cart against a league victory. Hasnatt Farouqui has been a valuable member of the team throughout the last five years. Always there to be a fine participant when not on active duty elsewhere. Tiago Giourly has been called upon when his body allows him. One day we will invent a Band Aid big enough to encompass his whole structure. And rookie Jack Turney was performing very well for the team before a serious foot injury curtailed his season, post October.

The team is also grateful to players that come up from the seconds or thirds to fill in during times of need. Tom Bailey, Jojo Shean, Rob Findlay, Michael Stewart have all been called upon this season or previous to help out the team and all have done

so with great commitment.

A big thanks must also be giving to 'The Gaffer' and racquets manager Paul Lindsay. He has spent ten years building this team. Unrelenting effort and soul searching. He's a scout, he's a coach, he's a selector and more than anything else, he's an all-round good guy that has the Club in his heart. He takes as much pride from this victory as any of us do and let's be honest, without him it would never have happened. So 'three cheers to Paul' for making this dream become a reality, and great timing for doing it on the league's 100th year.

Bath Cup Division Two season report

Roehampton Club Bath Cup 2s kicked off the season with a 3-0 victory at MCC, followed by another three points courtesy of the withdrawn Hurlingham team for this season. A great start as Roehampton Club 3's took a valuable point off title rivals Lansdowne 3 in their opening match.

Next up was a 2-1 win against a strengthened Queen 3 side. Jojo Sheen produced a great performance to win his individual match 3/2 against a very tough opponent and Dan Thomson was in fine form winning 3/0. Another 3-0 against RAC came next before Roehampton Club Members and Roehampton Uni students, Satomi Watanabe and Rana Ismail came to the rescue with last minute availability issues. With the captain being the one to let the side down on this occasion, it was a 2-1 victory leaving us one point off top spot in the standings.

Three more points came from our trip to Queens 2, before the first showdown of the season against Lansdowne 3. Two excellent performances from Tom Bailey and Satomi got us the victory on the night. Another truly consistent performance from the captain ensuring the result ended 2-1. Now level at the top of the table and with the morale boosting decision that the captain will resign himself to non-playing team management the

title was in our sights.

2-1 was again the result the following week against the Roehampton Club third team wiping out all the good favour they had gained from their opening match of the season.

Finally, a walkover against O&C closed out the first half with only a point separating the top of table, Lansdowne 3: 24 points Roehampton Club 2: 23 points

Knowing we needed a big second half, the second team went on to take full points from the next four fixtures. Cumberland again managed to take a point off the team but a solid performance from Ed Hopkins ensured it wasn't more than that.

A 3-0 victory came next against Queens 2, one week before the match that would most likely decide the title. Lansdowne with a 100% record so far in the second half had them ahead by two points.

The title clash did not disappoint for those who came to support the team. Rana put in a phenomenal performance to take the first match 3-0 with quite an incredible score line of 10/9, 9/0, 10/9. Next up was the no.1s for the evening. Tom put in a gutsy performance to take a well-deserved 3-2 win and Jojo, as reliable as always closed the match out with a 3-0 win of his own. Roehampton 2 were now a point clear with two matches to

play.

We welcomed new Member Rudi Willemse to the team for the penultimate match of the season against Roehampton 3's. He did not disappoint on debut recording a 3-0 win. The team took home all the points ensuring the one-point advantage remained with one to play.

Unfortunately, we were deprived the chance to win the league outright on court as O&C were unable to field a team, but the full 3 points ensured the division two trophy was Roehampton Club's. Our title rivals however, maybe seeing the writing on the wall ended the season with a 2-1 lose, meaning even without the three points gained from O&C we would have still come out on top.

It was a tough season with some truly incredible performance so I would like to thank the whole team again for all their efforts.

Open Singles

The final was always going to be a high-class affair between two top players ... the challenge was that no-one was sure who would be in the final.

After a successful Bath Cup season the final was played between Ben Coates and Lewis Walters. Ben having beaten Steve Richardson in one semi-final and Lewis beating Jojo Shean in the other. Worth noting Steve, Ben and Jojo did not lose a single of their respective Bath Cup matches this season.

Lewis is renowned for a slow start and the first game followed this pattern, as Ben, who was fully focused raced to a 8/3 lead and then an exchange of world class rallies saw Ben win the first game.

As if someone had flicked a switch the second game was dominated by Lewis leading 9/1 to then take the game 11/2. Lewis did not let up at in the third and the world class squash was matched as the tighter score line suggests as Lewis came from 4/3 down to win 11/5 and take a 2-1 lead in games.

The fourth game began closely, 3/3 then 4/3 Lewis. But as are the fine margins at the top-level Ben dug deep and saw a glimmer of hope at 4/4, kept his cool and applied pressure to take the game 11/4 and force the match into a deciding game.

Lewis was not going to give up easily though. Ben fell behind early on 2/3 but regained his lead with determination and high-class accuracy to open a 6/5 lead. Lewis tried to stay with Ben but from 7/9 down Lewis could not find the points needed and Ben closed out the game 11/7 and with it the match 3-2 to take his

second Club Championship Open title. (Having previously won it back in 2018).

The answer came quiet quickly as Alison opened a 7/0 lead, but Elspeth then relaxed and played a few of her wonderful attacking shots to get herself into the match. This did not deter Alison who took the first game 11/3. The second game Alison showed her class, and why she had just been selected to represent England at the Commonwealth Games in the squash doubles. The third was a near repeat of the second game with Alison controlling the rallies and hitting winners at the right time. Elspeth battled towards the end and from 10/2 managed to get to 10/5 but Alison calmy waited her time to win the game 11/5 and the match 3-0. Alison Waters beat Elspeth Young 3-0. 11/3, 11/2, 11/5.

Handicap Singles

A match between friends, as Andy Nowell took on Craig de Silva. Craig's handicap giving Andy a 5-point start in the first game could well have given Andy the confidence to start quickly ... and that he did. Some frantic rallies with deceptive shots made for great entertainment but it was Andy who raced to a 8/0 lead and then the game 15/5. Women's European Squash Club Champions 2022

Roehampton Club are Women's European Club Champions 2022 From 14th to 17th September, Riccione, Italy held the European Squash Club Championships. With Roehampton Club Men's and Ladies' teams National Champions they represented England in the European Club Championship 2022. Squad: Satomi Watanabe, Alison Waters, Rana Ismail, Kace Bartley.

The Women faced six matches in four days as they played out a round robin group with a potential final against the 1 seed Mulhouse on Saturday morning.

3-0 wins against SC Sandweiler (Luxembourg) and Gigantos Fricktal (Switzerland) on Wednesday, was backup on Thursday with a win over De Vaart Notre Dame (Belguim).

Friday's matches saw the Club face Skelleftea (Sweden) and Squash Italia (Italy) with the knowledge two wins would leave a straight head-to-head final on Saturday v Mulhouse (France). The team delivered winning both matches 3-0 on Friday to go into the final with a 100%-win record

Saturday's final produced the best match of the women's draw in the tournament.

First on court was Kace, playing at 3. Two very close games saw Kace take a 2-0 lead and we thought may have zapped her opponent of any will to fight on ... we were wrong. Day 2

After collecting our kit from the hotel we headed for Nicol Squash, a new, street-level club with four courts opened a year ago by Peter Nicol (former world number one). We enjoyed a lovely club lay out and relaxed atmosphere as we mixed squash with coffee and bagels and some Members enjoyed the experience of getting on court with Peter — a real highlight. Another match win for Roehampton Club.

As lunchtime approached the gang showered and headed off in the direction of the Hudson River, finally stopping at the Frying Pan, a funky boat restaurant for lunch. Refuelled and refreshed a walk back to the hotel via part of the Highline Walk and 6th Avenue showed us more sights of NYC.

After a change of kit we headed back out for our evening match at New York Athletic Club (NYAC). A slow walk up 5th Avenue taking in sights along the way and we were soon up to Central Park South, which includes Plaza Hotel – famously used in Home Alone 2

film as well as the south side of Central Park itself. We made our way to NYAC to again be stunned by the club's size, history and grandeur. 
