

Ladies' Golf Captain's Blog – 19th February 2026



Centenary Ladies' Open Gold Challenge Cup

Looking back a century to early 1926 – the year our late Queen Elizabeth II was born – Roehampton Club crowned its first champion, Mrs R. J. McNair, in the inaugural Roehampton Gold Cup.

Eleanor Helme, one of the leading golf journalists of the day, proclaimed that the trophy would become one of the most coveted in the women's game. With the extraordinary expansion of women's golf over the last hundred years, that prediction may sound a little overstated, yet victory in the Gold Cup has undeniably served as an important stepping stone in the careers of many distinguished players, including Trish Johnson, Catriona Matthew and Georgia Hall.

In that first year McNair had not expected to feature on the leaderboard. Disappointed at failing to break 80, she assumed that an 82 on the par-75 course had put her out of contention. What she did not realise was that her closest rivals were faring no better.

Even the distinguished Miss Molly Gourlay – one of the most celebrated golfers of that era, whom I had the privilege of meeting as a Surrey girl in the 1980s – struggled on the greens, her putting difficulties contributing to an uncharacteristic 84.

Many members today are delighted with a score in the 80s, with the benefits of modern equipment, lightweight clothing, and the immaculate condition of the course. Viewed through that lens, the scores achieved in the 1920s were exceptional. Competitors played in restrictive tweed suits and ties, wielding hickory-shafted clubs that demanded precision, rhythm, and remarkable skill.

Yet despite these challenges, scoring improved rapidly in the years that followed. The finest golfers of the early era graced the fairways at Roehampton Club, including British champions such as Miss Cecil Leitch, Miss Enid Wilson, and Miss Pam Barton (pictured below in that order), establishing a legacy of excellence that continues to resonate a century later.

Ricky and I teamed up again to take on our next challengers, Sandra Drum and Helen Maguire. We agreed on a 14-hole match, navigating temporary greens and bucket holes. Ricky came out blazing – 4-under through the first four holes – yet somehow, we still trailed by one. Sandra and Helen dovetailed brilliantly, both striking the ball beautifully and making every clutch putt to keep the pressure firmly on us.

We hung in and reached the turn all square, fully aware that only birdies would be enough to win holes. Fortunately, two arrived at just the right moment on the 3rd and 4th (playing as our 12th and 13th), courtesy of Ricky and me respectively. I then produced a par four on the 5th hole to take us over the line by one hole. What a fantastic game!

Remembering Alan Scott

It was with great sadness that we received the news in January of the passing of Roehampton Club's loyal former professional, Alan Scott, who served the Members from 1980 to 2008 with unwavering dedication, courtesy, and wisdom.

He was a perfect example to the Members with his gentle, uncomplicated way of teaching, always immaculately dressed, sporting wonderful shiny shoes!

Alan's bond with Roehampton Club was lifelong, having grown up at the Club from the age of 15, when his father, Syd, himself a successful tournament player, became Head Professional.



Although he spent his later years helping others improve their golf, Alan was an immense talent himself, winning the Roehampton Club Championship four times while holding the course record of 64. He knew every inch of the course and shared that knowledge generously, offering insights that Members still recall fondly – such as his reminder to watch out for the subtle undulations on the fairway bend of the dog-leg 15th hole to avoid an unexpected and embarrassing ‘top’ and never to give a putt on the 6th green!

Personally, I appreciated the fact that he was always interested to hear about our successes while being hugely encouraging when things hadn't gone so well! This year's Alan Scott Trophy on Saturday 21st February will be especially poignant. The event provides a wonderful annual opportunity to remember Alan, and it was so special to see him at the prize giving last year (pictured in the photo above).
